- The provision of Centre based day care and the transport will help provide a comprehensive coordinated and integrated range of basic maintenance, support and care services for frail older people and their carers as per the objectives of the Commonwealth Home Support Program.
- Physical access Our Community centre at 501 Forest Road, Penshurst accommodates the day care activities. We have an access ramp and disabled toilet and the place is disabled and wheel chair friendly & accessible to people with physical or sensory disabilities.
- Our usual Thursday meetings at Senior Citizen Centre, Hurstville are also conducted on the basis of Senior care with special activities to help the ISC seniors come out of their social isolation and improve their knowledge on community service facilities available to them. Currently we are having similar sessions once a month on Tuesdays in 3A Stapleton Avenue at Sutherland

• In partnership with the Hurstville Community Food Services, we have been successfully running the 'Sabari' Indian community traditional vegetarian food services for the past nine years. Our volunteers cook at the Hurstville Community Food services every week and food is served during our Thursday senior meetings at Hurstville Senior Citizens' Centre. The food is sponsored by caring seniors and their families. We have formed a food committee that work efficiently in offering their services in cooking, serving the elderly and washing up after the sessions. Our volunteers also take meals to house bound seniors who have the need. • To foster social inclusion for the

To foster social inclusion for the elderly ISC seniors and to build a sense of community and to improve the physical and mental health of participants, we are setting up a community kitchen , planning to equip and run it effectively, planning how to cook and share nutritious ,low cost meals. This will provide a venue for our Seniors' unique traditional experience enhanced by modern requirement for healthy lifestyle and to improve their personal and community well-being.

SPECIALISED INDIAN SUB-CONTINENT ETHNO SPECIFIC CARE

A number of seniors are above the age of 80 and the vulnerability of the individual to further deterioration shows the urgency of the requirement for provision of ethno specific culture and religious based services.

This opportunity for them to be served by an ethno specific organization run by seniors who fully understand their cultural and dietary needs, helps support them to be more independent, thereby enhancing their quality of life.

RAIN is the best option to provide flexible, timely services that respond to the ethno specific needs of these people. (Social Support services provision for two days per week for 22 ISC seniors in total).

Without discrimination – Eligible people assessed as needing a service are offered access to Commonwealth CHSP services without discrimination on the grounds of ability to pay, location, gender, ethnicity, language, marital status, religion, sexual preference or type of disability.

Activities such as mentally stimulating games, memory quizzes, Indian songs, Yoga and relaxation exercises, art and craft sessions and spiritual and guest speakers are some of the activities planned.



NEW MEANING TO LIFE

In 2006 a group of three migrant seniors thought about forming a network to provide consolation and companionship to the companionship-thirsty, isolated and lonely seniors.

After several sessions of discussion a fantastic network was born. Now the baby had to be named....many suggestions came forth. The name had to be matched with the purpose and the best choice was **'RAIN'** abbreviation for Resourceful Australian Indian Network, a name that respected the dignity of seniors and their experience. With strong passion and loving care, Sudha Natarajan a highly educated and intelligent lady took to nurturing the growing RAIN with equally committed support from Veda Srinivasan (Looked after the physical and soul well-being through Yoga sessions) and Saro Srinivasan (Practising Clinical Psychiatrist whose expert advice and mentoring shaped RAIN's bright future).

The practical challenge of having a space to grow in had to be faced and thanks to Hurstville City Council RAIN had a venue at Senior Citizens' centre and the growth began. Started with a few members and a few Leader and Indian Link articles later, we had the privilege of the Sydney Bhajan Group of truly resourceful seniors joining us and we had the efficient leadership of Usha Sanghvi and Harihar Patel who led the Bhajan group.

The three had become thirty and RAIN born in March 2006, got incorporated in September. A management Committee was elected with Veda as the Chair person, Ushabehn as Secretary and Saro the treasurer. Sudha became the Public Officer. I was part of the committee assisting Sudha and closely monitoring the tremendous growth and progress. Mr Damodar Sodha was our next Chair Person and the committee took on projects that promoted community development and culture sharing with the wider Australian Community.

Thursday afternoons at Hurstville became a hive of activity soon and the neighbourhood got used to seeing a trail of ladies in sarees walking up from the train station to the seniors' centre. Based on need networking with several Community service organisations started and soon Sutherland RAIN sprang into action under the able leadership of Loga and Sushma.

The growing RAIN 5 years old in 2011, needed a place to call its own 'Home'. Mr Ambalal Patel started the donation campaign with a \$5000 cheque and with the community staunchly supporting and helping hands and generous hearts pitching in to help 501 was purchased and more challenges pursued. We needed to make the premises liveable, we did that in stages. We soon created a community garden. Silent supporters like Dr Naker, Radhamani and Gopma Naidu took this as a personal commitment and RAIN Home evolved.

Built with love and care this is the Home for Indian Seniors where those with disability gain strength and seniors are respected and dignity, solace and compassion are encouraged.

FROM THE C E O









A privilege of being CEO of RAIN is the opportunity to gain rich experience from our seniors, our staff and volunteers. With every passing year, new set of values are adopted, and it is wonderful to see those values in action. The many highlights of RAIN are: IDENTITY:

We have created an identity for ourselves with broad input from staff and stakeholders. Our intention is to raise our profile with clients and potential clients as well as to ensure that our public image better matches our mission and values. The format of this Annual report is an indication of our new approach.

CHALLENGE

RAIN prides itself in working differently and exploring better options all the time. We constantly challenge ourselves to better meet community needs, and find better options. Always facing the challenge of managing with the limited space and the growing numbers, and with support from Mr Mark Coure' our State Member for Oatley, we have successfully secured NSW Government support for the ramp, kitchen and carport facilities and this year the centre will get a face lift with rendering of the building and painting. We will soon have a spacious hall to accommodate our life-long learning activities and the centre based day care for the seniors, We are grateful to the generous Indian Community members for their praise-worthy generosity.

The two social support groups (in Penshurst and in Sutherland) maintained their quality delivery, and offered enhanced services, such as ethnic festivities and temple visits in response to seniors demand. Positive consumers feedback is now a regular feature of our centre's operations.

Choice

Client outcomes led to greater choices. As one example we have started a new social support group at Ashfield with support from the Ashfield Council with venue provision and a grant to do the RAIN Green environmental project.

A number of significant project funding have been won including continuity of Commonwealth Home Support Program for the next three years.

With introduction of CHSP and the Aged Care portal system, our staff (who have gained the required qualifications with RAIN support)put much effort into preparation for the world of client-directed care, including actively developing social support strategies and interesting activities for the coming years. **Innovation**

In preparation for opportunities for better and structured service provision, we commenced development of a model of care which would integrate long seniors day care with carers support, primary health services and community development.

Collaboration


Increasingly, much of our work is done in partnership with government policy makers and other service delivery agencies

These efforts have helped change our thinking from traditional program categories to a much more client-focused approach.



SURVEY AND PRODUCTION OF DVD

AIM: Examining the psychological and physical health issues of Indian Sub-Continent seniors (women) residing in the St George & Sutherland regions in order to develop culturally sensitive interventions.

PROJECT FUNDED BY:

DISTRICT, NSW HEALTH

SOUTH EAST SYDNEY LOCAL HEALTH

PROCESS: A detailed survey was carried out by RAIN in 2013. Data collected was processed by Dr Ritin Fernandez (Nursing professor, St George Hospital) and Dr Cathy O'Callaghan (NSW Department of Health).

FINDINGS: Overall most of the participants had traditional cultural expectations and responsibilities regarding family, nuclear family, elder care, marriage, divorce, gender roles and family living arrangements. Many respondents identified that they had significant caring responsibilities, particularly for their grandchildren which impacted on the time they had for themselves.

OUTCOMES: The results pointed to more community education about family support options for older Indian women and their families. Indian women could also become aware of social support opportunities beyond looking after children. More social support could also be provided to older women looking after children such as grandparent groups.

Evidence from the findings are being utilised to initiate further measures to develop meaningful and sustainable relationships. Accessing meaningful and culturally appropriate activities is vital in promoting healthy and active ageing. Resourceful Australian Indian Network (RAIN) provides a space and network for various cultural and social activities specifically for the Indian Sub-Continent community in the St George and Sutherland areas. In consideration of the health issues revealed in the surveys, it was proposed that a DVD 'The Story of Ageing' be produced to explore the issue of loneliness, widowhood and health issues in old age. Some of the women who have conducted the survey were approached to tell their stories.

A steering committee was set up to oversee the development of this DVD which included general practitioners, RAIN President and office bearers, St George and Sutherland Hospital Diversity Health Coordinators, St George Mental Health, Professor of Nursing St George, Cultural Diversity Officer at Hurstville Council, bilingual counsellors and two film makers.

The DVD had a dual purpose of: educating service providers about the cultural, physical and mental health needs of this community; and informing the community of the physical and mental health issues of older people (and women in particular) and how these issues may be addressed. Interviews, filming and making the DVD were done by two students who are qualified in photography as well as in community service. Diwali celebration in line with Hurstville City Council's Discovery Art and Health Festival in November, was chosen as the main festive event to launch the DVD. This video was also shown at health support groups supported by NSW Health department.

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MOTIVATION: RAIN is motivated by a need to find an alternative source of funding to plug a financial gap.We also have the social commitment to deliver high quality social care for disadvantaged frail aged ISC seniors, create employment for disadvantaged groups and empower the ISC community. and RAIN sees social enterprise as a way to achieve this aim.

Formalising process we developed a set of criteria around our motivation to help create a range of flexible and supportive employment or training opportunities within this business.

Training new migrants and young mothers who wish to have part time job opportunities to train in cooking skills, food safety and kitchen management.

The business offers a real working environment in which older people would want to work as mentors and volunteer training is offered as part of life long learning

Working in this business will promote health and wellbeing, develop employability and reduce social exclusion for all ages.

This set of criteria has helped us to make decisions and is something that we refer to repeatedly throughout the business development process and in evaluating the impact of our activities.

We don't have to realise our dream singlehandedly, RAIN committee has the drive, vision, charisma, determination, resourcefulness, commitment and motivation to inspire others to make this a team effort.


Research: Community consultations ,Social enterprise workshops, discussions with partnering organisations, trying out ideas with seniors. experimenting each idea to see whether it will work, analysing the financial benefits. all done by seniors themselves and we have finally reached the decision to provide seniors with an opportunity to turn their cooking expertise into beneficial catering activity, turning their assets into rewarding financial outcomes.

RAIN plans to run a Life Long Learning Centre, a Community Kitchen & Café venture that involves the community in need of social support, inclusion and empowerment.



RAIN LIFE LONG LEARNING CENTRE: RAIN centre at 501 Forest Road, Penshurst will soon have a Life Long Learning activity and training room as an extension to the current lounge. We are extremely grateful to our generous donors and the NSW *"Community* Building Government Partnership" Grant in making it possible to include a wider drive way with broader entry, a new car port and a community kitchen. We wish to acknowledge with gratitude the support of the State Member of Parliament for Oatley Mr Mark Coure'. With the funds raised for building an activity room and library for a Life Long Learning centre (which will provide language classes, Scripture reading and analysis, training courses for our volunteers and important informative courses for seniors) we have commenced construction at 501 Forest Road. This is in line with our aim to provide a creative and knowledge based positive diversion in the lives of seniors of the ISC community.

RAIN kitchen will provide the atmosphere and opportunity to make our seniors come out with the abundant knowledge they have about food, health and medicinal values of the herbs that they use. They will have the opportunity to share with their peers different methods and varieties of cooking thus enhancing their self-esteem and encourage social inclusion. They will be encouraged to do cooking demonstrations under the able guidance of trained staff to practice the retrospective approach and train them to be independent gaining more self-confidence.

Information sessions that will enhance the knowledge about healthy eating, Food safety procedures, budgeting healthy food and meal planning will be organised .Involvement of other community groups in the kitchen will bring more interest in recipe sharing and get more friends and members attending these sessions.

Community kitchen will help family members taking care of frail aged seniors as food will be available to take home to cater to their need as well Long Term goal: serve ethno specific INDIAN vegetarian Meal to all those in need of it in local community groups, the house bound needy seniors as well as those who are in nursing homes in the St George region.

Customers, Service Users: Social enterprise workshops which were carried out in the past two years have developed the idea, shaped it into realisable dream and all these are wholly influenced by ideas brought about by the community elders, their carers, volunteers as well our caring staff and committee members. Every Thursday afternoon 45 seniors are provided with healthy lunch and we have social support groups for Indian Sub-Continent frail aged who look forward to in-house prepared hot meals during our centre based day care sessions. Carers will also be our regular customers.


RAIN plans to engage with committees of other community services to source catering opportunities to provide traditional Indian vegetarian meals during staff meetings, workshops, special events, , Local Council harmony events etc.

The carers will be happy to have take home meals when their elderly get back home and they do not have to cook after a day's tiring work. It will be a positive change which they look forward to.

Junior Senior Excursions: We had 4 excursions this year. they were well attended and participants were very enthusiastic to continue these 3 monthly.








Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to be able to report on another robust financial year for RAIN. Income for the 14/15 financial year was \$1,71,834, which represents continued growth compared with income of \$1,17,326 for the previous 13/14 financial year.

Expenditure for the 14/15 period was \$1,04,050, and the surplus has helped us bring down our previous year's unsecured loans of 146,000 to the current liability of 112,000.

Income was once again generated mostly in our three key areas – Commonwealth Government CHSP Social Support Program (\$55,334 or 32.2 %), Community development projects (\$ 43,260 or 25.2%) and Memberships , donations and fund raising events (\$73136 or 42.6%). I must make special mention of the Social support group yet again, which, enjoyed further growth in number of people attending in Hurstville ,40% increase year on year!

The \$30,000 grant from the Community Building Partnership Program of NSW State Government for a wider drive way, car port and kitchen renovation helped us a lot in updating the facilities and we are grateful to Mr Mark Coure' our State Member for Oatley for this support.

I wish to acknowledge the Hurstville and Kogarah City Councils' support and contribution, which assists us to provide a quality community service to local Indian Sub-Continent Community residents. We are also thankful to Illawara Catholic Club for the Clubs NSW grant which helped us with providing a better environment and beneficial activities for the elderly in the community.

\$ 35,409 or over 30% of expenditure was on staffing, an investment which pays dividends for our members in terms of service delivery. The remaining expenditure \$16,389 was on transport for the seniors as part of the CHSP program and \$13,428 was spent on meals provision. The rest of the expenditure was for operational costs such as programming, cleaning, utilities, updating IT and stationery.

Through prudent planning, the management committee has been able to keep membership rates flat for the third year in a row.

Whilst I will continue as a Trustee and member of the management committee, this is my last year as Treasurer. I am pleased to be leaving the Centre in such a solid financial position, largely as a result of the continued and combined efforts of the committee, staff, volunteers and members, who without doubt are the Centre's biggest asset.



RAIN Inc got involved with Ashfield Council for the first time in 2015 by participating in the Carnival of Cultures. The intergenerational program was very successful and Henna and Rangoli demonstrations were well attended.

Mariam Hi the council cultural co-ordinator saw a need to start an Indian support group at Ashfield and approached RAIN Inc to support the program. Ashfield Council provided the venue free of charge during the last 6 months of 2015. The group met once a fortnight. There were young mothers and elderly who attended the program. Various activities were organized by RAIN Inc like Art and Craft, Yoga, Medical Talks and Permaculture Garden talk. Meditation by Dr Naker was quite popular and had received positive feedback. Morning tea was provided which gave the group a chance to mingle. Slowly the group number has started building up. The RAIN members also visited the meetings to support the Ashfield members and at those meetings lunch was provided.

We applied for the hall for 2016 and Ashfield Council has kindly allowed us a free use of the council hall for the Indian social support group to meet. RAIN Inc will organize the activities. RAIN Inc has also received a grant from Ashfield Council of \$2000.00 for the Rain Green Project. For the next year the activities will include table top gardening, healthy living activities for a sustainable lifestyle and community garden visits. This will give an opportunity to young and old to mingle and share knowledge. It will provide a great opportunity to meet members from different backgrounds.

RAIN will once again participate in the Carnival of Cultures and in Ashfield Council's senior week activities and is planning to provide Bollywood dance entertainment and will also have stalls for Rangoli and Henna. "How to wear a sari" demonstration will also be organised.

We are very excited and are looking forward to fostering our relationship with Ashfield Council. It has been great working with the council members who are very friendly and helpful. We are indeed grateful to Ashfield Council for the opportunity to establish the RAIN Ashfield Indian Support Group.

Commonwealth Home Support Program





FUNDED BY COMMONWEALTH HOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME, DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND AGEING

RAIN has successfully registered itself as a Special needs, ethno specific Indian Sub-Continent Community organization to deliver Social Support Services in the New Aged Care portal and we are well on our way entering data in the new DEX portal of the Department of Social Services.

The Commonwealth Home Support Program's (CHSP) stated objectives are to deliver timely, high quality entry-level support services, taking into account individual goals, preferences and choices, to help frail older people stay in their homes as long as they can and wish to do so.

The CHSP commenced on 1 July 2015 and the existing HACC clients are supported under the CHSP. Our existing Centre based Day Care services is now called 'Social Support Group' services and offered threeyear funding agreements under the CHSP until 30 June 2018. CHSP and Home Care packages will merge to create an integrated at home package from 2018.

RAIN will facilitate new **referral pathways**, managing the transition of existing clients, implementing a **fees framework** and maintaining a **centralised client record** via My Aged Care.

CHSP Clients are encouraged to become more empowered to work in partnership and make decisions about their care through a wellness approach.

To implement a wellness approach, we adapt approaches towards clients, to do 'with' rather than 'for'.
